#### NOTES FROM THE PASTOR

Hello, CVUU Beloveds!

This is the summer issue of the CVUU Newsletter. We're all ready for some warm weather and, if we're lucky, a more relaxed rhythm of life for the next few months.

On May 21st we gathered for our Annual Meeting, where we ushered in new leadership and voted on the upcoming year's budget. Thank you to Sheri Huber-Otting for your year as our Board President! I've enjoyed getting to know you more and have been moved by your love and care for this community. This past year, the CVUU Board determined our year theme (New Growth from Deep Roots!); considered options for building security following a breakin and addressed ways to help staff feel safer working in the building; and negotiated changes in staff titles and wages. In January, the Board promoted Kate Flynn from Coordinator of Children's Religious Education to Director of Children's Religious Education to better reflect her responsibilities and the CVUU's expectations of the position. I'm grateful for Sheri and the Board's engagement. In the upcoming year, Dennis Harbaugh will be our Board President. I am so excited to work with Dennis, and can't wait to see what the year ahead will hold.

The 2023 General Assembly is scheduled from June 21st - 25th in Pittsburg, PA. This year's GA will include a vote on proposed amendments to Article II. UUs are deeply engaged in this conversation, and so we're sending three delegates to GA for the vote. Al Hays, Mary Kay Madsen, and Mandy Boody will all lend their voices and their vote to the process. We've engaged in some great conversations regarding these changes, and invited the congregation to chime in. I've loved witnessing the fourth and fifth UU Principles in action ("Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations," and "A free and responsible search for truth and meaning"). I've enjoyed this unfolding conversation. I'm excited to spend time on the delegate floor with Mandy and Al (Mary Kay will join GA virtually) and continue to engage in the unfolding polity of our shared faith. A reminder—proposed changes to Article II include transforming our 7 Principles to 7 Values. The 7 proposed Values put Love at the center, with petals surrounding that core Value with Interdependence, Equity, Transformation, Pluralism, Generosity, and Justice. I've heard it explained that the 7 Principles describe why we are Unitarian Universalists, and the 7 Values describe how we are Unitarian Universalists. I'm so looking forward to this year's General Assembly, where we will continue to deepen our conversation.

This July will hopefully include a bit of summer vacation. I'm hoping to visit my dear friends Lucy in Nashville, and Clare in Colorado. I encourage folks at the CVUU to all indulge in the slower pace of the summer. We'll continue to hold Sunday services in person and on Zoom, but some committees are taking the month off. The volunteers and staff who dedicate their time and energy to this Beloved Community work remarkably hard. I hope we can all find ways to wind down and recharge during Iowa's arguably "best" season. In August, staff, Councils and Committees will get together to plan for the year ahead. I'm looking forward to this time of planning, and our Kick-Off Celebration in September! Quick shoutouts to Gerry Chamberlin for continuing to document and track the details of the life of our congregation; to our Stewardship Committee-Heather Flory, Micaela Rich, Karen Impola, and Mandy Boody-for a truly historic, tremendously successful campaign that brought equitable pay to our staff and minister(!!); to Mike Knapp and the Finance Council who have balanced our budgets, had challenging conversations as well as celebrations, and ensured the health and longevity of this Beloved Community; to all those who participated in my ordination this spring—the events of that day will always be a highlight of my life and I am so grateful; and to Sheri Huber-Otting and all the members of the CVUU board as well as all chairs, liaisons, and members of the Councils and Committees who keep this place running. I continue to be deeply moved by the way this congregation has nurtured my ministry, loved me, and granted me the privilege of companioning this community as we make our way as a strongly connected, deeply engaged, justice centered, progressive and radically welcoming, shared faith. Thank you all for the past year. Looking forward to looking forward, collectively, in the fall.

### Meet Our New Members~ Mike and Rita Waggoner

Mike was born in Portland, Oregon, grew up in Michigan and Indiana, and lived in Alaska for six years—his spiritual home. He came to Iowa in 1988 spending thirty-two years at UNI and has been mostly retired since 2020. He likes trapshooting (but is not a hunter), golf (an entire industry built on hope), reading (history, biography, detective fiction, and most of whatever their book club of thirty-four years selects), playing the bass (bluegrass, folk, some jazz, and classic rock), and the New York Yankees. Mike enjoys having his daughter, son-in-law, and granddaughter nearby and Joel when he can get back from New York. Having been married fifty-two years, he particularly enjoys having more time with Rita. They've had good friends at CVUU for years and feel very much at home here.

Rita has lived in Iowa for over thirty years. The family moved

here when their kids were little for Mike to take a job with the University of Northern Iowa. She was raised in South Bend, Indiana but

her extended family is all originally from Providence, Kentucky—a small town in western Kentucky, a coal mining area. She and Mike met at Wheaton College in Illinois and traveled around while he was in the Army: Texas, Illinois, Oklahoma, and finally Alaska. They returned to Alaska after the military experience and lived out in the woods near Fairbanks for a while. They returned to the

Midwest for Mike to attend a PhD program at the University of Michigan and both of their children (Joanna and Joel) were born in Ypsilanti, Michigan. After completing his degree, they moved to Iowa and have stayed ever since.

Rita's main work in Iowa has been with Hawkeye Community College, especially at what was then called the Success Center or Metro Campus. She taught English as a Second (often third or fourth) Language to newcomers to the area. Many of the current Bosnian citizens came through her classes, as well as some Congolese, Burmese, and people from Central and South America. She did some teaching on Hawkeye's Main Campus as well as serving with the TRIO program there.

Her interests are quiet ones—she loves reading, writing, and good conversation; practices Tai chi, takes walks around the Green Belt near their home; and hangs out with their granddaughter, Max whenever possible.

They have been a part of several congregations here over the years, gradually moving outward as life and spiritual direction shifted. They have been "UU-adjacent for many years" with so many good friends here. This year their daughter Joanna, her husband Erik, and granddaughter Max, moved to the area and decided to become active in the UU congregation. That pushed them to finally join for real!

Rita helped out last year at the UU Pride Booth and had her "elevator speech" ready: "The CVUU congregation is one of the very few fully LGBTQ welcoming congregations in the Cedar Valley. CVUU is a community of shared values, not held together by any system of belief. There is room for me to bring my whole self into this space." Rita says, "Thanks for sustaining this unique place and having a radical welcome for all in the community."

#### GREEN LIVING CORNER

### A Green Sanctuary?

In the late 1990s, the Conscious Living group was formed by UU members *Mildred Pierce*, *Jim Paprocki*, and *Juanita Williams* to strengthen our commitment to the UU 7<sup>th</sup> Principle. We worked to make our building more energy efficient, conserve resources, and learn about pertinent issues. We began recycling, using washable mugs, and hosting information programs.

The Unitarian Universalist Association established the "Green Sanctuary" program in 2004, to encourage congregations. Mildred Pierce was instrumental in beginning that process by obtaining the guide manual and application.

Our board recognized the Green Sanctuary group as a standing committee and committed to support our efforts. Our first activities included an energy audit of the building with the Cedar Falls Utilities and creating a communication plan to involve the congregation.

Our action plan had to include four activities in each category: Worship and Celebration, Religious Education, and Environmental Justice and Sustainability. The application was submitted and we were accepted as a candidate by the UUA in 2006.

Here are some activities planned and carried out.

- We showed videos including *An Inconvenient Truth* and *What Killed the Electric Car*. The public was invited.
- The congregation participated in Earth Day services, including one at Hartman Reserve. Our minister, *Rev. Eva Cameron*, joined with pastors from other denominations.
- A vegetable garden was planted on the church grounds. Produce was sold on Sunday to the congregation and proceeds given to the Northeast Iowa Food Bank. UU member *Julie Fischer* led the effort. Over \$500 was donated to the Food Bank in 2007.
- Children's religious education included a unit "Keepers of the Earth". Children and youth joined in to care for the garden.
- Composting was established to enrich the garden and lessen garbage going to the landfill. We recycled plastics, cardboard, glass, and office paper.

- Several of our members helped to educate the public about the proposed coal-fired power plant in Waterloo.
- Members held workshops to make draught stoppers, warm hats, and cloth napkins.
- We worked to conserve energy when buying new appliances, replacing siding, and purchasing a new furnace.
- Our congregation joined Iowa Interfaith Power and Light's program, Cool Congregations, which focused on reducing carbon footprint. We held a workshop with computers available so members could calculate their family's carbon footprint. A light bulb display compared incandescent, fluorescent, and LED use and cost, in terms of energy use and dollars.
- Each year we held an Alternate Gift Fair so that we and the public could sell and buy gifts for a more sustainable world. *Juanita Williams* and *Donna Davis* were instrumental in its organization.
- We participated in U.S. Highway 20 litter clean-up for a couple of years, led by *Mica Lorenz*.

In the spring of 2009, we made a formal application as a Green Sanctuary Congregation and received our Accreditation in November, 2009. An official presentation was made at the General Assembly of Unitarian Universalists in Minneapolis, MN in June, 2010.



Today, we still strive to honor our 7<sup>th</sup> Principle by recycling, maintaining a pollinator garden, planting native tree and shrub species, and conserving energy. *Donna Davis, Sally Browne* and *Mary Kay Madsen* lead the planting efforts.

I'd like to challenge the CVUU to once again prioritize our commitment to the 7<sup>th</sup> Principle. Climate Change looms large over the planet. Let's make a difference!

# TIME AT THE CVUU AND AWAY: PART OF THE UU MINISTERIAL AGREEMENT

It's common knowledge that ministers don't work a 9-to-5 job, but did you know that UU ministers typically work a six-day work week and are responsible for monitoring their time to ensure an appropriate balance of work and time off? Ministry is understood as a calling, and the work of ministry is time-intensive and subject to unforeseen events. Sufficient down-time is essential to maintaining personal health and professional sustainability, and our CVUU ministerial agreement is designed to help our minister find that balance. This article provides a few highlights from *Pastor Emma*'s ministerial agreement related to her time at the CVUU and away from us, as recommended by the national Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA): <www.UUA.org>.

Ministers are most known for the work they do on Sunday mornings. However, in addition to Sunday services, Pastor Emma provides many other types of ministry to the CVUU, including participation in almost all council, committee, and Board meetings; serving as the head of staff for our three paid staff; providing pastoral care for congregants as needed; helping re-develop our religious education program; and more. In these multi-faceted roles, priorities are constantly shifting. Pastor Emma often works evenings and spends time in ways less tangible such as addressing congregational problems. Pastoral and congregational crises can occur at any time including days off.

It is expected that UU ministers will have, at a minimum, one day per week free of all Congregational responsibilities and one additional day devoted to study and writing wherein they will be available only for emergencies. Therefore, Pastor Emma works a six-day work week. Her day off is Monday; her study and writing day is typically Saturday.

To offset this full work schedule, each CVUU fiscal year, in keeping with UUA recommendations, Pastor Emma receives four weeks of vacation (24 days), four weeks of study leave (24 days), ten days of sick leave, paid holidays, and one month of accrued sabbatical leave. In addition to vacation and study leave, attendance at national UUA General Assembly, regional UUA gatherings, UUMA (Unitarian Universalist Ministers Association) Chapter Meetings, and Ministry Days are considered associational responsibilities for which our minister may be away from the CVUU. Because of these various reasons to be away from the congregation, UU ministers typically lead or co-lead worship services between 30 and 35 Sundays each year.

For those who are interested in doing the math, during this fiscal year, Pastor Emma took 10 days of vacation last fall, 11 days of vacation and 4 days of study leave in late December and January, 6 days of study leave in March, 7 days of study leave in April, and 4 days of study leave and 1 day of vacation in May. In June, Pastor Emma will be away from the CVUU from June 16 – June 30 on a combination of General Assembly time (and travel time), study leave (3 days), and vacation time (2 days). She will return to CVUU work on Saturday, July 1<sup>st</sup> just in time for our new fiscal year!

Note: Sometimes Pastor Emma is called back to CVUU work unexpectedly, which means that days she announced she would take off aren't taken as scheduled and must be rescheduled for later. This year, this phenomenon resulted in a couple of extra days being added to Pastor Emma's time off at the end of June.

Pastor Emma determines the schedule of her time away from the CVUU in consultation with the Religious Services Council, the Shared Ministry Council, and the Board President. # SHAKESPEARE IN THE GARDEN AT THE CEDAR VALLEY ARBORETUM




