Can You Speak Cherokee? Kristine can.

To commemorate Indigenous People's Day on October 9th, the forum speaker on October 8th will be CVUU and Cherokee Nation member, *Kristine Nemec*. For the last couple of years, she has been learning the Cherokee language, using the "Syllabari" created by Chief Sequoya about a century ago. There is a national movement to bring back the indigenous people's languages that were lost, which happened primarily through removing a generation of children from their families, placing them in "Christian" boarding schools, and forbidding them to speak their native tongue. Kristine says that she has learned more about the Cherokee world view through her language study.

October 15th

Concert by the *Burning Heretics* during the second hour this day; there will be no Forum.

October 22nd

Exploring our UU Heritage ~~ Al Hays

The Soul Matters theme for October is "Heritage." This session will explore our spiritual heritage by discussing the early Unitarians in America. This will <u>not</u> be a lecture, although Al will speak a little at first to set the context. The bulk of the session will be a discussion focused on several short readings that he will provide. The discussion will include some "old favorites" like Emerson and Thoreau but also one or two people who are less well-known.

Hosea Ballou 2d was born on October 18, 1796 in Guilford, Vermont. A grandnephew of Hosea Ballou, he wrote *Ancient History of Universalism* (1829). Before becoming a minister, Ballou was a schoolteacher, first in Stafford, Connecticut, and then in Roxbury and Medford, Massachusetts. He worked with Horace Mann as a major advocate for public education. Ballou also edited and wrote for several Universalist periodicals and was president of Tufts College from 1854 to 1861. He died on May 27, 1861.

[Editor's Note: Ballou was named after his uncle and went by the name Hosea Ballou 2d.]



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Thomas Lamb Eliot was born on October 13, 1841 in St Louis, Missouri, the son of William Greenleaf Eliot, Jr. As a student at Washington University, he suffered a serious eye injury that often required him to have someone read materials to him. Nevertheless, he graduated from Harvard Divinity School and became minister-at-large and then associate minister in St Louis. Repeating his father's legacy, Eliot headed to a frontier town of 6,000 inhabitants-Portland, Oregon-and entered the ministry of its new Unitarian church. He built up the congregation, founded Reed College, and was a civic leader with great impact on the cultural and political development of Portland. In later years, his eye injury forced him to accept his son-in-law, Earl Morse Wilbur, as an associate minister. He died on April 26, 1936.

YOUTH JUSTICE CONFERENCE

The juvenile (youth) justice system is, unfortunately, a point of entry into the criminal justice system for many young people. The system has traditionally handed out very punitive sentences, including incarceration in youth facilities, for youth who have been convicted of relatively minor offenses. Perhaps not surprisingly, these harsher sentences fall disproportionately on youth of color. Harsh sentences rarely serve to rehabilitate these youth and are correlated with deeper involvement in the adult system. However, there has been a strong movement nationally to reduce youth incarceration, which has succeeded in achieving substantial reductions. Unfortunately, Iowa has been behind the curve in this, as in so many areas of criminal justice reform.

The CVUU will be co-sponsoring a conference entitled "The Movement to Reform Youth Justice: Getting Iowa on Board." This conference will take place at our church on Thursday, October 26th from 8:30 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. It will be a hybrid conference on Zoom and in person. The keynote speaker will be Josh Rovner, Youth Justice Director for The Sentencing Project, who will discuss the national picture. There will also be panel discussions of various areas of concern in Iowa.

The main sponsor of this event is the Iowa Justice Action Network, a statewide network of citizens concerned with criminal justice reform.

In person and Zoom registration for this conference is available at https://iowajusticeactionnetwork.org/. The cost is \$30 for in person (which includes lunch) and \$15 for Zoom.

GREEN LIVING CORNER Water is Life

My husband, *Byron Plumley*, and I attended a meeting on August 10th at the Floyd County Fossil and Prairie Center, organized by Iowa Citizens for Community Improvement (CCI) members. EPA Region 7 Enforcement and Compliance Assurance Division Director, David Cozad, came from Kansas City to meet with the group. People testified about how their well water is no longer drinkable, how it was no longer safe to swim or even kayak in many bodies of water historically enjoyed. Visual aids for the group's presentation included a map of the week's beach closures, the Iowa DNR (Department of Natural Resources) most recent (2018) map of swine operations which maps the locations of over 7,000 hog farms of over 500 animals at a given time, translating to 26 million total swine units. A graph was presented (using DNR sources) documenting impaired waterways in Iowa tripling in number, from about 250 in 2002 to about 750 impaired waterways in 2022. This data shows the leading cause of pollution in waterways is bacteria, often associated with waste from animals and people.

We learned that "factory farms" act with impunity; that despite stated rules and guidelines, the DNR has not issued even one clean water permit. Corporations are not being held accountable for what is presumed to be manure disposal and use that has impacted our waterways, affecting rural wells where people are forced to buy bottled water, and urban treatment centers where so many chemicals are added to water to make it safe to drink, that it tastes bad. Iowa public health data from 2023 ranks rising cancer rates, second in the nation only to Kentucky.

CCI members are asking factory farm corporations, not Iowa taxpayers, to pay to clean up Iowa's water.

Iowa's own DNR recommends testing wells yearly, yet almost two-thirds of wells were tested just once between 2002 and 2017. (A map illustrating this data by county can be reviewed at ">https://www.ewg.org/interactive-maps/2019_iowa_wells/map/>.) One small farmer at the meeting we attended testified that she requested her well be tested as a baseline when she learned a Concentrated Animal Feeding Operation (CAFO) was expected across the road from her; only to learn her water was already undrinkable, due to the overall unregulated pollutants in her watershed. Present day Iowa sources estimate CAFO operations create 22 billion gallons of unmonitored, untreated manure.

People at the meeting bristled when EPA Director Cozad suggested that people want cheap meat, but he is correct. They do, and they are paying less at the supermarket, but the cost is Iowa streams and lakes become dead zones, and rural America becomes just another population to dump on. Let's support those farmers who are trying to farm their land in sustainable ways that honor creation, but who are not subsidized by the false economies of cheap meat and ethanol production.

What gave me hope at the meeting was one person's testimony about their growing up in the Shell Rock watershed. The Shell Rock River is fed from Lake Albert Lea inside the Minnesota border, and when this person was growing up, at some point the river nearly died. It was discovered that a meat packing plant in Albert Lea was dumping directly into the watershed. When the 1972 Federal Clean Water Act passed, it became illegal to discharge any pollutant from a point source into navigable waters, unless a permit was obtained. The river was saved once, (so it's possible!) but present data shows lack of regulation for CAFO waste disposal has rendered it endangered once again.

Let's work together to clean it up-in Lakota words, Mní wičhóni, water is life.
