NOTES FROM THE PASTOR

A few days ago, I was holed up in my office at CVUU, diligently preparing for the coming Sunday. My phone pinged, and it was a message from my partner. They'd heard from the channels of "BeeTok" (that's beekeeper TikTok, for those who don't partake) signals of a brutal winter ahead. Beekeepers across the Midwest were reporting their bees were kicking the drones out of the hive seven weeks early. Rather than storing up honey in the channels of their hive, bees were only packing honey around the Queen—an indication that it would be too cold for bees to move up the channels to get to their food stores in the dead of winter. Further, anecdotal reports of all black wooly caterpillars were everywhere. Nature seems to know what's coming, far better than modern day humans, at least.

So, with this news, we've set our focus on preparing for winter. We have some considerable winterizing to do. We've needed new windows forever, but the likelihood of completing that project by snowfall seems less likely by the day. But there are other things that we can do. Making batches of soup to portion out in our deep freeze, winterizing the cars, and updating our winter walking gear are currently on the list. Perhaps most importantly, we're making plans to keep our hearts, souls, and minds warm during the bleak winter months. For us, this means lots of time in fellowship with our Beloved Community at CVUU. Cozy tea dates, weeknight game gatherings, and of course coffee hour on Sunday mornings will get us through till spring. How are you preparing for winter? Where does the CVUU factor into your seasonal plans? I hope, like us, you'll lean on this community as the weather gets colder and our spirits get a bit damp. Iowans are hearty folks, certainly. I think it's our community spirit and good neighborliness that makes us that way—that and the windchill. Let me know how you're preparing for the season; and please, join me for tea, or lunch, or a chilly midwinter walk!

REPRODUCTIVE JUSTICE SMALL GROUP NEWS

On Sunday November 12th the Canterbury Forum will host the third and final program in its fall 2023 series: "Abortion Rights: The Road from *Roe* and *Casey* to *Dobbs*", presented by Prof. Francis Degnin of the University of Northern Iowa's Department of Philosophy and World Religions. In his description of the program Francis writes:

"The Supreme Court's *Dobbs* decision radically changed the abortion landscape in the US. But it didn't change everything. For example, it didn't change the position, asserted in *Roe*, that the US Constitution is silent on the question of whether an unborn fetus is a person. It also didn't challenge the notion that a right to privacy is inherent (implied, but not named) in the Constitution.

What are the key points, and rationale, of the *Dobbs* decision? Of the dissent? This talk will focus on explicating those key points as well as providing a limited assessment of some of the strengths and weaknesses of the arguments on both sides of the decision."

In his October 2018 talk to the Forum, "Exploring Personhood", Francis offered a nuanced analysis of the perspectives on that issue in the debate over reproductive rights. We look forward to hearing his analysis of the judicial path that led to *Dobbs*, the decision itself, and where the debate on this crucial political, social, and moral issue stands today.

Francis' program will begin at 7:00 p.m. central time. There will be a Zoom link some time the week prior. For more information, contact the Canterbury Forum Coordinators at <www.canterburyforum.net>.

On October 12th your CVUU Board held its regular monthly meeting. After participating in a moment of silence for victims of war in the Middle East and around the world, we had another substantive and productive work session. In addition to receiving reports from all seven CVUU Councils and officers, the Board. . .

- Received and discussed a proposed Lay Minister Policy.
- Finalized CVUU Goals and Action Steps for the year, and assigned each Action Step to a Council, committee, or individual to ensure implementation. (Read our Goals & Action Steps elsewhere in this newsletter.)
- Gave approval for the Building & Grounds Council to identify and work on projects this fall with the local Cub Scout/Boy Scout troops we sponsor.
- Were informed about the Iowa Safe Churches Network, and how *Pastor Emma* has registered as a 'Safe Clergyperson' willing to provide support and advocate for trans youth in Iowa.
- Established a process and deadline to complete an evaluation form required as part of Pastor Emma's continuing UU 'Fellowshipping' process.




THANKSGIVING POTLUCK



Urban Mini-Forests Provide Resilience to Climate Change

In the 1970's Japanese botanist and plant ecologist, Akira Miyawaki, developed a technique to create fast growing mini-forests that mimic the interactive community of an ancient forest. The mini-forest can work in a more conventional urban garden or park in an area of at least 12 x 12 feet or a little larger. Layers of native trees, shrubs, and perennials planted close together can be incorporated into small spaces nurturing biodiversity which would support all manner of life above and below ground. He won the Blue Planet Prize, the environmental equivalent of a Nobel award in 2006 for his method of creating fast-growing native forests.

The mini-forests provide resilience to climate change. They hold moisture, cool the air, absorb and store carbon, provide habitat for pollinators and birds, and condition the soil. Cooling the air in urban areas is especially important in places where there are a lot of concrete surfaces that absorb and retain heat. They are faster-growing than just planting trees. Reconnecting people with nature is another benefit. As Dr. Miyawaki puts it, "The forest is the root of all life".


Thousands of mini-forests have already been planted in Japan and India has planted hundreds. They have been planted in Europe, Africa, Asia, South America, Russia, and the Middle East. Now, due to an environmental crisis, they are slowly beginning to appear in the United States. Possible sites could include: city parks, backyards, parking lots, the grounds of colleges and industrial sites, and highway interchanges.


Steps to planting a Mini-Forest:

- 1. Choose a site at least 12 x 12 feet.
- 2. Draw up a list of native plants that would work for you. Include a mix of deciduous trees, evergreens, shrubs, and perennials.
- 3. Prepare a nutritious and moisture-retentive soil.
- 4. Buy a range of saplings that are 2 to 3 feet high—maximum diversity is important.
- 5. Lay plants out by separating species for variety and random height. Aim for 3-5 saplings per 3 square feet.
- 6. Mulch and water once a day for the first few months, weed while the plants are filling out.

CVUU GOALS (WITH ACTION STEPS)

In August your CVUU Board held a retreat and prioritized several goals for our congregation to accomplish during the current fiscal year (July 1, 2023-June 30, 2024). Over the past two months the Board refined these goals, created action steps which will lead to the achievement of each goal, and assigned each action step to a Council, committee or individual to help ensure implementation. Since we're currently one-third of the way through our year, we've already completed a few of the action steps, but much work remains.

These goals are not just **Board** goals, they are **CVUU** goals, and we need active participation from you to accomplish them. Some goals involve internal workings at the CVUU, others are focused on larger community involvement. Please review the goals and action steps below and get involved to help make these modest dreams a reality!

Goal #1: MAKE OUR CONGREGATION A MORE WELCOMING PLACE FOR YOUNG FAMILIES.

<u>Action Step 1</u>: Beginning in September, provide two vetted adult volunteers to staff the nursery during each Sunday morning service.

Action Step 2: Plan ahead to provide childcare for specific CVUU events (New to CVUU, I Want to be a Member, New Member mixers, Treats & Talents Auction, etc.).

Action Step 3: Beginning in October 2023, provide at least one free potluck meal per quarter following a Sunday service.

Action Step 4: Have CVUU representatives attend training in the Our Whole Lives (OWL) curriculum, in preparation for offering OWL classes to our youth.

<u>Action Step 5</u>: During this program year, provide training which encourages CVUU members to use language that facilitates a sense of belonging.

Goal #2: IDENTIFY AND ENCOURAGE SPECIFIC EFFORTS TO LIVE OUT OUR VALUES OF JUSTICE AND EQUITY, AND OUR PREVIOUSLY ADOPTED 8TH PRINCIPLE.

<u>Action Step 1</u>: Prior to June 30, 2024 have the Religious Services Council devote two Sunday services to practically living out the 8th Principle.

Action Step 2: Publicize and organize in advance to assure we have at least 10 members represent the CVUU at one public social justice event per quarter.

Action Step 3: Invite speakers or representatives of oppressed communities to speak during Sunday services or Second Hour.

Action Step 4: Look for opportunities to engage and/or collaborate with predominantly Black or other minority organizations.

Goal #3: IMPROVE SYSTEMIC COMMUNICATION THROUGHOUT THE CVUU.

Action Step 1: At the beginning of the year, distribute the preferred personal communication method of all CVUU officers, Board members & staff (text, email, phone, other) to all parties to facilitate effective communication.

Action Step 2: By no later than June 30, 2024, establish a working text/email messaging system to alert members about specific events and activities in a timely manner.

Action Step 3: Have each Council chairperson be responsible for contacting other Council chairpersons when there is a possibility of overlapping plans or needs.
