GREETINGS FROM OUR INCOMING PRESIDENT

I've been a member of the CVUU (formerly the UUSBHC) since 1998. Before that, I attended the First Unitarian Church of Berkeley, perched high in the hills of Kensington overlooking the San Francisco Bay. https://uucb.org/

What are your plans for this summer?

I will be traveling—first to London to teach my UNI Study Abroad course, and then to the Netherlands to join my Dutch friend Sonja in Amsterdam, Delft and Groningen. Then I'll drive to Oregon to visit my brother and his family in Bend, and to help with the making of an Italian-American film in Eugene. The rest of the film will be made in the Friuli Venezia Giulia region of northern Italy. Unfortunately, I can only help with the U.S. part because I have to return to Iowa to teach my classes at UNI!

Whenever I travel, I try to visit a Unitarian or Unitarian Universalist church along the way. One of my favorite Unitarian churches is the Rosslyn Hill Chapel in Hampstead, North London: <https://www.rosslynhillchapel.org.uk/>. Over the years, I've gotten to know some of the people there and look forward to attending their Sunday services.

One memorable visit to the Rosslyn Hill Chapel was on Flower Communion Sunday, where adults, children, and a member's dog participated in the ceremony. The dog was off leash (as most good dogs in London are) and sported a large red flower on his collar.

Another memorable visit was during the weekend of the Summer Solstice. I had taken my students to Stonehenge the day before; while we were there, we saw a Druid Solstice ritual complete with a formal procession, white robes, and banners. Although the ancient Druids did not build Stonehenge, it is considered a sacred space for many modern Druids and members of other pagan religions.

After the service at Rosslyn Hill, I told a group of people during coffee hour that my students and I had seen a Druid ceremony the day before. One person said that I *MUST* meet Roger and Trish, two elderly pagans who were going to a Solstice ritual on Primrose Hill later that day. I chatted with Roger and Trish for a while and decided that it would probably be safe to go with them. I felt rather sheepish doing so, since I tell my students to NEVER ACCEPT A RIDE OR A DRINK FROM A STRANGER IN LONDON! But I figured if they were Unitarians, how could they be strangers? (Spoiler alert: I lived to tell the story!)

After Roger showed me how to extract a blessing from a tree, we hopped into his car and drove to Primrose Hill. The event was a lot like our pagan rituals, but with fewer native American elements and more Celtic ones. There were lots of foods, drinks, and candles spread out on a cloth underneath a tree. And yes, I did accept a chalice of mead from my new-found friends! A dog and his owner joined us for our walk to the top of Primrose Hill. He was, of course, off leash (as most good dogs in London are).

If you haven't visited another UU church in the U.S. or abroad, I definitely urge you to go. The most impressive churches tend to be on the East coast, but there are some beautiful ones throughout the United States and Europe. I love walking into a new church and seeing how similar (and yet how different) it is from our church. When I introduce myself as a member of the CVUU in Cedar Falls, Iowa, I'm always welcomed with warmth and enthusiasm!

Which UU churches have you visited? I would love to hear about them when I get back in July!

In the meantime, have a wonderful late spring and early summer!

GENERAL ASSEMBLY 2024 "LOVE UNITES, STORIES IGNITE" Held Virtually, <u>June 20th - June 23rd</u>

This year I have been following what is being proposed for the final version of Article II and I look forward to hearing and reading the debate on the amendments; I'm excited about many of the changes that are being proposed.

We also had the opportunity to vote on Social Action Activities that would be taking place. The music led by Dr. Glen Rideout throughout GA was wonderful and inspiring. RALLY HELD TO SUPPORT IMMIGRANT RIGHTS

A dozen CVUU members showed up to support immigrant rights at a rally May 1st in Waterloo, organized by the Queen of Peace church in Waterloo. The rally was in response to the Iowa legislature's new law scheduled to take effect July 1st—modeled on a Texas law currently blocked in court—that allows states to deport or jail people based on their immigration status.

Here is what Mark Stringer, ACLU of Iowa Executive Director says about SF 2340:

"The Iowa law enforcement and state judges tasked with authority to carry out this outrageous legislation are not trained in immigration law and have no proper authority to enforce it. This legislation encourages and facilitates racial profiling and stereotyping. It undermines—not promotes—public safety and the rule of law. It will consume already strapped state court and law enforcement resources. If enacted, this law will wreak havoc in Iowa families and communities and threaten Iowans who are citizens and noncitizens alike."

Hawthorne's Puritan heritage haunted much of his work, but part of his dour outlook might be traced to his mother's almost complete self-seclusion after she was widowed in 1808. Hawthorne married Sophia Peabody, sister of Elizabeth, and belonged to Transcendentalist circles. Hawthorne adored his family, but they were very poor. He worked at a variety of government jobs and served as American consul at Liverpool, England. He lived variously at Brook Farm, the Old Manse, and the Wayside in Concord, Massachusetts.

CRONING CEREMONY

Everyone is invited to Floralyn Groff's Croning Ceremony, to be held Friday, June 7th at 4:00 p.m. at the CVUU. All sexes, genders, and ages are welcome to attend.

**Note: we need to begin right at 4:00 p.m. so please come early which will allow time for accommodating chairs as needed!

What is a Crone? It is not an old hag, as pictured in old folktales. Two thousand years ago, very old women were particularly important members of communities. They were leaders, counselors, and healers. They were the fulfillment of female experience and wisdom. As women aged, they used their experiences and memories to benefit the community, and Crones were revered and appreciated.

In recent years, some women have been reclaiming the name and status of Crone and commemorating this valuable stage of female development. Who decides who is a Crone? The woman herself. Usually, they have gone through the Maiden and Mother stages and have completed menopause, but a woman can declare herself a crone at any age.

What is a Croning Ceremony? It is simply a gathering of people who wish to commemorate the occasion of a woman claiming her Crone status. It can include readings, music, and sharing.

Floralyn has chosen her 77th birthday to have her ceremony (she was born on June 7, 1947), which will include a seven-circuit labyrinth experience for those who wish to walk it. Any woman who wishes to claim her Crone status is welcome to do so during the June 7th Croning Ceremony. Marilyn Delange will be claiming Crone status at this ritual. On June 1, 1803 William Ellery Channing was ordained as a Unitarian minister at the Federal Street Church and Society in Boston, the only church he ever served. He was twenty-three. The church was built in 1744 as Church of the Presbyterian Strangers. Later it became the Society of the Congregation in Federal Street and is now the Arlington Street Church.

Books by Dr. Douglas Tallamy

Henry Ford was born July 30, 1863 on a farm near Dearborn, Michigan. In 1903 he started the Ford Motor Co., which became enormously successful. Ford is the father of the Model T which sold for \$850 at first, which would be about \$16,500 today. The prices eventually dipped lower than \$280, which is about \$3,000 today. By 1925 he was producing almost two million a year and everybody had to have one. He died at the age of eight-three in 1947.

Through parades, parties, protests, and educational events, *Pride Month* (globally celebrated in June) underscores the rich diversity within the LGBTQ+ community, acknowledges the significant achievements made in the pursuit of equality, and highlights the ongoing struggles faced globally. It serves as an essential platform to increase visibility, encourage conversation, and further progress towards true equity and acceptance.

We were watching and cheering as the Unsung UU Awards were presented to *Ken* and *Roger* at your Annual Meeting. Frank Lloyd Wright was born on June 8, 1867 in Richland Center, Wisconsin. He began his practice of architecture in Oak Park, Illinois, and developed a devoted following. He lectured and wrote extensively, published an autobiography in 1932, and mentored many students. Wright is considered by many to be America's foremost architect, championing what is known as the Prairie Style. He built 532 homes and other buildings, including Unity Temple in Oak Park, Illinois; the First Unitarian Society of Madison, Wisconsin; the Imperial Hotel in Tokyo; and the Guggenheim Museum in New York City. He believed that people should not have to be rich to live in beautiful homes, and he tried to design artistic, affordable housing that complemented its natural surroundings. Wright was an active member of the First Unitarian Society of Madison, Wisconsin.



The *first normal school* for training professional teachers opened on July 3, 1839 in Lexington, Massachusetts. It began with three women students and reflected principles of education developed by Unitarian Horace Mann.

The famous Unitarian philosopher and political economist *Jeremy Bentham* died at age eighty-four on June 6, 1832. Bentham had instructed that his body was to be embalmed, dressed, and placed in a chair. It now resides in a glass cabinet in a corridor of the main building of University College in England. At meetings of the governing body, he is recorded as "present but not voting".

- If you or a CVUU member needs pastoral care or a visitation, contact the Caring Connection Team contact person, which rotates each month and is publicized each week in the CVUU Weekly Update and the monthly newsletter.
- If you have ideas, questions, or concerns about anything related to Sunday services, contact *Karen Impola* (Co-Chairperson of the Religious Services Council).
- If you have questions or concerns about anything related to the CVUU building, contact either *Roger Hahn* or *Bill Brown* (Building & Grounds Council).
- In case of a personal conflict or the need for conflict resolution within the CVUU, contact *Heather Flory* (Chairperson of the Shared Ministry Council).
- Inquiries about funerals or weddings should be directed to either *Heather Flory* or President *Dennis Harbaugh* (June) or President *Carolyn Hildebrandt* (July).
- If a pressing need arises which doesn't fall into one of the categories above, or in case of emergency (member death, fire, etc.), contact President *Dennis Harbaugh* (June) or President *Carolyn Hildebrandt* (July). If the president is not available, contact Vice-President *Karen Impola*.

During this sabbatical time, we encourage Council and committee chairpersons to be especially aware of how their decisions may impact others—excellent communication between Councils and committees is critical! If in doubt, reach out, make contact, and inform others. Our established communication processes (Weekly Email Updates, newsletters, calendar info), as well as Board, Council, committee, and task force meetings, are continuing during the sabbatical.
