NOTES FROM THE PASTOR

On the outside of Dysart, Iowa, heading straight west down Sherman for one mile with the sun in your eyes, then a sharp right onto Highway X, up a gradual incline with a farm on your left (two horses, chickens, many barn cats, the farm dog that barks and barks and then follows you for a while) corn forever on your right, directly across from the town's gargantuan sky blue and white water tower, is a cemetery. It's roughly the size of two and a half football fields, side by side by side, I'd guess. Dysart's town founders, the Dysarts, are buried there—as are many of the town's earliest residents, dating back one and a half centuries. Many of the folks who live in Dysart have lived in Dysart their whole life. Many of those Dysart folks are buried out in the western Protestant cemetery, straight down Sherman, left on highway X, cresting on the only perceptible rise of flat land around, the sun setting at its back, across Iowa's giant sky, eternally. (A much smaller Catholic cemetery sits adjacent to the Casey's on Dysart road, on the east side of town. I don't see many sunrises myself, but I imagine they're lovely from that spot.)

Living in Dysart, I walked to the cemetery regularly for years. I like cemeteries. I find them peaceful, and I like reading the headstones. When I adopted Roberta, my seven-year-old Bracco Italiano dog and soulmate, I'd walk her out to the cemetery so she could run and run. I'd unhook the leash from the harness around her snout, and she would take off running laps. Straight down the paved drive bordering the headstones, curving a wide left to fly down the wide-open strip of yet unplotted grass, then around, returning lap after lap to bark her joy at me, taking off to run it again. I'd never seen a creature experience such ecstasy as Roberta did when she was running free. But she was terrible on a leash. She'd lived the first seven years of her life on a chain in a backyard somewhere. A failed hunting dog, she ran away a lot. The third time she showed up at the shelter, her family declined to retrieve her. Then she was mine, and she'd never walked on a leash in her life. She was a mess every time, yelping and barking and jumping and trying desperately to catapult herself magically to the place where we were going so she could run. She was so dramatic-whining, yelping, and barking as we walked-that I often worried my neighbors would hear her vocalizing her distress and call the ASPCA. Yet the moment we crossed the threshold of the cemetery, and Roberta was released from her tether, she transformed. Every unbearable moment of the walk on the leash we took to arrive at the place where she found her joy, was worth it the moment we arrived. Every. Time.

I haven't walked to the cemetery since Roberta died in January of 2021. It's been too painful. My heart aches just typing it. But as I wrap up my season as a Dysart resident, I am planning one last walk out to the cemetery. I'll bring a small amount of Roberta's ashes to scatter there. I might talk to her awhile, tell her that even though this was the place we lived together, she is with me wherever I go. I'll watch the sun set across Iowa's endless sky. And then I'll walk back to town. I'll walk into whatever the new season I'll be walking in brings.

On the first Sunday of February, the CVUU will celebrate Imbolc with a labyrinth walk. The spring equinox walks us out of one season of darkness and rest, into a new season of increasing light and new growth. Walking is a traditional ritual of the holiday. A way to reflect on the passing season while entering the next. I hope you'll join us as we walk into a new season together.

GREETINGS FROM THE PRESIDENT

February is the month of love—romantic love, love of family, love of friends, love of our non-human companions, love of nature, and love of the ideas and institutions that we cherish. The CVUU theme for this year is *Love at the Center*. Not only does this reflect the values recently endorsed by the UUA, but decades of scientific research on how we can promote individual and collective health and wellbeing.

While preparing to leave office this January, Dr. Vivek Murthy reflected on his tenure as the 19th and 21st U.S. Surgeon General. In an interview with *Time Magazine* he said, "I realized over two terms that there were critical questions I have been grappling with. The main one is: "What was driving the deeper pain, the unhappiness I was seeing for years across the country?" A major cause of this unhappiness and pain is an epidemic of loneliness and lack of community. Hence, Dr. Murthy's parting prescription for our nation—build community!

According to Dr. Murthy, "Community is a place where we have relationships, help each other, and where we find purpose in each other. Those three elements are the core pillars of community. Community is also a place fueled by a core virtue: that's love, which manifests in generosity, kindnesses, and courage. When you put these together, then you have a place where people find a sense of belonging and meaning."

Dr. Murthy, who is Hindu, has touched upon many of the key values that we share as UUs.

He notes, "What I have found over my two terms is that for many people, that sense of community has eroded. We have millions of Americans struggling with loneliness: a third of adults and half of young people. People's participation in both formal and informal service remains low. And more than half of young adults in a recent survey said they felt either low or no sense of meaning and purpose in their lives."

One reason for this decline in community is the COVID pandemic, where many of us worked hard to limit our face-to-face interactions to help keep ourselves and others safe. Another reason is the proliferation of personal entertainment and communication devices. Years ago, families used to share a daily newspaper, weekly magazines, a radio, a telephone, and a TV. If you wanted to see a new movie, you could go to a public theater. If you wanted a new book, you could go to a public library. Now, all of this information can be easily accessed on our personal devices—cellphones, iPads, laptops, watches, and desktop computers. Although online communities can meet some important needs, they are no substitute for healthy, contemporaneous human interactions.

This lack of community has been observed both in the US and abroad. In fact, it has even led the UK and Japan to appoint Ministers of Loneliness to help get people together in meaningful ways.

What does the CVUU have? We have a Minister! But we also have a whole group of like-minded people who are working together to build community with love at the center. In doing so we are guided by our Covenant, our Seven Principles (yes, they are still alive) and the Six Values recently endorsed by the UUA.

February community-building opportunities at the CVUU include Mindfulness Meditations, Sunday Services, Adult Forums, Small Group Ministries, Community Service Groups, and Social Activities such as the First Friday Dinner. If you haven't been to church lately, please join us! You can attend in person or via ZOOM!

On January 9th your CVUU Board held its regular monthly meeting; here are a few highlights:

- **Category B Congregation: Our proposed budget for the new fiscal year will reflect our church's growth into a Category B size congregation. Therefore, ministerial and staff compensation will increase according to the recommended UUA guidelines.
- Guest Musician Program: We now have funding to invite guest musicians to perform at the CVUU during Sunday Services. Carolyn Hildebrandt will recruit musicians from UNI, UNI Suzuki, and Wartburg College to perform special music/music for meditation, prelude, and postlude music, and to participate in leading congregational hymns.
- Two Open Positions: We are still searching for a Music Director and second Coordinator of Children's Religious Education (CCRE). If you are aware of any good candidates, please let us know.
- Continued Conversations with the UCC: Members of the CVUU have been meeting with members of the United Church of Christ to explore possible purchase of their building. As of now, the UCC congregation would like to continue using the building for their own functions. We are at the stage of getting to know each other better and deciding how that arrangement might look.

As part of its founding outreach, the congregation contacted an Episcopalian named Caroline Veatch, who provided for the church to receive income from her oil fields in Germany after her death. The church has since turned this income into the largest single source of funding for the Unitarian Universalist Association and its work.

IUUWAN NEWS

IUUWAN's purpose is to form connections and collaboration among Iowa's fourteen UU fellowships to amplify social justice work, because together we'll have a bigger impact.

Presently two 'action teams' are working with representatives of Iowa UU congregations. The action teams collaborate on ideas to inspire action from UUs in the state. CRITICAL BIRD HABITAT IS UNDER THREAT

For the first time ever, land designated as wilderness is at risk of being declassified. Reach out and share your comments with the Fish and Wildlife Service today.

Alaska's Izembek National Wildlife Refuge—one of the world's most important migratory bird staging and wintering habitats—is under attack. For many years, a way to connect the remote community of King Cove to Cold Bay, a larger town with an all-weather airport and better medical care, has been sought. A nineteen-mile road through the heart of the refuge's wilderness area has consistently been rejected in favor of other alternatives. Now, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has come up with a new plan of swapping some of the refuge's wilderness land for other lands that could be turned into a new wildlife refuge.

If you care about wilderness and waterfowl, you can provide comments to the Fish and Wildlife Service's draft Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement *before the February 13, 2025*, deadline. Lydia Estes Pinkham was born on February 9, 1819 in Lynn, Massachusetts. Her family was Quaker but abandoned that religion because they felt it was unwelcoming to the African Americans who came to their meetings. Eventually the family joined the Universalist Church. They also joined the Female Anti-Slavery Society, and Pinkham organized the Freeman's Institute, a debating society that welcomed everyone, regardless of religion, race, or politics. She worked as an unpaid visiting nurse and developed a compound to treat every female ailment. Her sons persuaded her to market the compound, which was eighteen percent alcohol, and she developed a successful business. Pinkham wrote a book on the "facts of life" and another on the female reproductive system through all its stages. After her death, her publisher continued to print "her answers" to personal letters, and that practice, along with information about the alcohol content of her elixir, led to the formation of the Federal Food and Drug Administration. Lydia Estes Pinkham died on May 17, 1883.

Sent by the American Unitarian Association, *Martha* and *Waitstill Sharp* left on February 4, 1939 for Czechoslovakia to work with refugees from the Nazis. This marked the beginning of the Unitarian Service Committee, which was organized in May 1940 as a standing committee of the association "to investigate opportunities for humanitarian service both in America and abroad." The USC became independent of the AUA in 1948. In 1963 it merged with the Universalist Service Committee, which was first organized in 1945, also as a response to the war in Europe. The Unitarian Universalist Service Committee focuses on humanitarian aid, development, and human rights in America and throughout the world.
