### NOTES FROM THE PASTOR

Despite the protest of thousands of Iowans, the Iowa legislature passed a law removing Transgender people from the state's civil rights code on February 28<sup>th</sup>, 2025. They are the first legislature in the nation to do so, but we can expect they won't be the last. That same day, I began a practice I'm calling "a Zelensky". Until this war is over, until all people are guaranteed their rights, I'm in uniform. I am wearing my clergy collar when I am "out and about" in the world, especially when I'm "on duty". I am wearing my collar along with a smattering of pins and accessories that signal my support for the Transgender community and other marginalized peoples currently being targeted by the Administrations at the Federal and State level.

I am wearing my collar in Witness to the atrocities committed by human beings unto other human beings in the name of G-d. I am wearing my clergy collar in Solidarity with all Transgender Iowans, and all Transgender Americans who are under threat. In Solidarity with all those who are in danger under fascism. (We are all in danger under fascism.) Until the day Justice flows like water, and Peace like an ever-flowing stream—I'm in uniform.

As you know, this practice comes at a time of my family's personal displacement. As we seek a safer home in the Cedar Valley, as we experience transition and uncertainty, a uniform reminds me of my purpose in this fight. *Skylar* calls my collar "a symbol of my station in society". I call it "my courage". When I wear my collar, I feel strong and brave. I feel firm in my convictions regarding the inherent worth and dignity of all people, and accountable to my Faith and my sense of Call. I feel powerful enough to fight back against oppression.

I encounter people every day who are in this fight, too. There will always be more of Us than there are of Them. All Together Now is the only way forward. I believe all people are God's Beloved Children. This includes Transgender people, and Immigrants, and the Poor, and the Disabled, and on and on and on. This belief matters to me now more than it ever has. Wearing my collar reminds me of my responsibility to do everything I can to protect God's Beloved Creation. So, expect your minister to look like the coolest priest you've ever seen for the foreseeable future. If you happen to catch me out and about not in uniform, please assume it's intentional. Sometimes I'm coming back from a yoga class, or an event where a collar might not be appropriate (a recent visit to Chuck E Cheese was one place where I thought it might be off-putting to others, for example). And if you've developed a practice to bolster your courage and keep you focused during these times, I'd love to hear about it. Now let's get back to Making Good Trouble.

## **GREETINGS FROM THE PRESIDENT**

Happy New Year! I'm writing this article in Istanbul, having just celebrated Nowruz (Persian New Year) with a group of international friends. I love the idea of celebrating the New Year on the Vernal Equinox, when the hours of light and darkness are equal, and the light is poised to overtake the darkness hour by hour, and day by day.

Our group consists of seven friends of different ages, genders, ethnicities, and sexual orientations, all united in our love of the Italian language. Our Italian teacher is from Rome, but the rest of us are from Iran, Panama, the U.K., and the U.S.A. The main purpose of our trip is to give our fellow student, twenty-nine-yearold Mina from Iran, an exciting new experience. This journey marks many firsts for her: riding in an Uber; flying in an airplane; traveling outside of Iran; visiting a Christian church; visiting a Mosque with Christian imagery (Ayasofya); attending a modern dance concert where the outlines of the women's bodies could be seen by all and where the male dancers could actually touch the female dancers on stage; going to a bar; drinking a cocktail; using a single-stall, unisex restroom in a bar; and wearing shorts and sleeveless tops in public. All during Ramadan!

It's noon now, and I can hear the call to prayer from the center of the old town where we have rented a house for a week. We are awaiting the arrival of an Italian friend who is in the Turkish dance troupe that we saw last night. We will be serving a Turkish-style breakfast with eggs, roasted potatoes, bread, cheese, olives, and a salad of tomatoes, cucumber, sweet red peppers and dill. We will finish with coffee, tea, and a plate of Turkish sweets.

Three days ago, the mayor of Istanbul was arrested. He is a popular opposition leader who was slated to run against Erdogan in the next presidential election. Many lines of communication have been shut down, public performances have been cancelled, roads have been blocked, and there is a greater police presence in the city. All of this is in an attempt to stem the inevitable protests, which have now been declared illegal.

As Turkey slides further into autocratic rule, we need to remember how quickly any democracy can change into a dictatorship. Our country is in great danger right now. What can we do about it? RESIST. We cannot stand by and watch as our government is dismantled by a group of billionaires who say one thing and do another. We need to resist now, before it is too late.

Children's RE will occur weekly throughout the month of April, with Nursery Care offered to anyone who might need it.


There will be an *Egg Hunt* for the children at 11:15 a.m.

## REPRODUCTIVE JUSTICE SERVICE AND MORE...SUNDAY, APRIL 6<sup>th</sup>






# APRIL DEADLINES FOR THE CALENDAR AND NUUSLETTER

The Unitarian inventor and industrialist *Peter Cooper* died at age ninety-two on April 4, 1883. His ironworks in Baltimore, Maryland produced Tom Thumb, the first steam locomotive built in the United States. He was the first in America to use the Bessemer process to refine iron from ore. Cooper was also the president of two telegraph companies that together connected communication across the Atlantic Ocean and North America. Cooper was a leading member of the Unitarian Church of All Souls in New York City.

## GREEN LIVING CORNER Pollinator Garden Spring Planning

On Saturday, March 8<sup>th</sup>, pollinator garden volunteers met to set priorities for Spring and Summer 2025 work. Present were Donna Davis, Betsy Brant, Jill Miller, Cathy Ryan, Rebecca Quentin, Rosa Torres, Mollie Wallsteadt, and Sally Browne.

Accessibility emerged as a top priority. Getting into the garden more easily is essential whether the garden stays where it is or is moved elsewhere, according to future congregational needs. The plan for this season is to clear and level the main path through the garden and put down a layer of new mulch.

Another priority is labeling plants with more visible and durable signage. Discussion is ongoing about best materials for the purpose and how much information to include.

Other season priorities include completely removing the rose bush and moving the bike rack to a more suitable location.

John Lothrop Motley was born on April 15, 1814 in Dorchester, Massachusetts. A member of distinguished families on both sides, he socialized with the top literary figures of his day. He was an historian and novelist and wrote numerous articles for the North American Review. His books include two histories of the Netherlands, *The Rise of the Dutch Republic* (1856) and *History of the United Netherlands* (1860-1867). He also wrote *The Life and Death of John of Barneveld* (1874). Throughout his life, he traveled extensively in Europe. President Ulysses Grant appointed him minister to Great Britain in 1869, but he was forced to resign over disagreement with Grant's policies. Motley was an active Unitarian Layman.

On April 19, 1949 *Beacon Press*, at that time the publishing arm of the American Unitarian Association, published "American Freedom and Catholic Power". This bold critique of the Roman Catholic Church, by Paul Blanshard, expanded Beacon's audience far beyond its academic and denominational following. Beacon was entering a new era in its history as it sought to publish intelligent answers to the pressing questions of the day. The result of this new vision was a significant increase in the number of books published, heightened visibility, and increasing respect for the Unitarian publishing venture.



On the *first Saturday of May* people from all around the globe will be walking for World Peace. This event began in 2009 and is sponsored by The Labyrinth Society and Veriditas. It has evolved into a day that is intended to create a global wave of Peace passing from one time zone to the next all around the world.

Walking the Labyrinth is an opportunity to experience mindful meditation by walking a single circuitous path to the center and then back out again.

#### WOMEN OF FAITH OF THE CEDAR VALLEY

Nurturing Armenian Spirituality and Culture Through Medical Mission Work Tuesday, April 8<sup>th</sup> at 6:30 p.m. Cedar Falls United Church of Christ

You are invited to learn about a medical mission where it is a priority to affirm and heal the physical and behavioral needs of the people in order to make space for spiritual growth. As a public health practitioner and descendant of Armenian genocide survivors, *Eileen Daley* completed her work through the lens of population health and trauma informed care, where healthy people are the building blocks of healthy communities of faith, housing, education, and work. Eileen says, "It is a story worth telling. Every day I was witness to remarkable resilience, beauty and gratitude by a population silently mourning generational loss."

On April 11, 1865 *Mary White Ovington* was born in Brooklyn, New York. She descended from New York Unitarian abolitionists and spent her life fighting for social justice. She was inspired by Booker T. Washington and W.E.B. Dubois. A founder of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, Ovington worked tirelessly for the organization for decades. She lived in the Tuskegee Apartments in Manhattan, where she was the only white resident, and sponsored racially mixed dinners in an era when that was dangerous. Ovington worked to bring black women into positions of authority in the NAACP and wrote a history of that movement, *The Walls Come Tumbling Down* (1947). Her ashes are interred at Community Church (Unitarian) in New York, where she was a member. Mary White Ovington died on July 15, 1951.
