NOTES FROM THE PASTOR

On the first weekend of April, I visited one of my favorite American cities—Portland, Oregon. Spring was on full display in the city, and I felt my own self coming alive as my eyes feasted on an abundance of green. My allergies were wide awake, too! My first morning, I walked in the beaming sun, feasting my eyes on freshly showered spring flowers. I couldn't resist shoving my nose into a rose bush in full bloom. I inhaled more raindrops than scent, coming up for air to discover I was soaking wet, laughing and choking, clearing the water from my nostrils and shaking off what I could from my clothing. Spring arrives with a vengeance sometimes, calling us into the wild, growing, blooming mess of it.

That Saturday, I marched with thousands of others through the streets of Portland, joining in the national grassroots Hands-Off Rally. While I was on the West Coast, many CVUU members participated in the Hands-Off Rally in Waterloo. Taking the train into the city, I noticed many other people heading to the same event. Interestingly, and encouragingly, demographic analysis of Hands-Off rally attendees indicates the majority of participants were Boomers. I can only imagine the dismay and the outrage proliferating throughout that generation. Boomers fought for equal rights for all people. Their insistence on equal rights elevated women, people of color, and LGBTQ Americans towards more accessible self-determination. I think many never imagined we'd ever go back to the way things were before-when women were required to marry to survive, when People of Color were kept from the vote via "poll taxes" of all kinds, when you could be fired or worse for being gay without recourse. "Every single American should be out in the streets," I overheard a woman on the train say.

Every American-who can do so safely-should be out in the streets expressing their outrage and dismay at this hostile government takeover. I am encouraged by the reemergence of the "Old Guard", the Boomers who can't believe they're still protesting this garbage. Those are exactly the folks we need on the front lines. The people who are familiar with old school demonstrations, who have the time and the privilege to safely and effectively resist. There are many people who don't feel safe protesting right now. As targeted marginalized groups determine how to navigate increasing threats, those of us with the most privilege must show up at every opportunity to communicate our distress at our quick slide into fascism, and our solidarity with those who are most vulnerable. I think about the furious bloom of spring, when life suddenly bursts forth and the dead earth cannot resist the greening. We must protect the garden's most fragile flowers. The more audaciously we bloom, the more we conquer what threatens to cut us off at the bloom, the stem, the root.

GREETINGS FROM THE PRESIDENT

Alleluia! Spring has finally come!

As I write this column, my lawn is greening and the daffodils are nodding their frilly yellow heads. I can leave my sliding glass door to the backyard open for my elderly dog, Eddie, to go in and out without inviting too many flies and birds into the house. Once summer comes, I'll need to find another solution, but for now, leaving the house open works fine.

I love the ancient Greek and Roman myths about the changing of the seasons—Hades and Persephone (Pluto and Proserpina), the gods of the spring winds, Zephyrus (Favonis), and Flora, the Roman Goddess of Flowers and Spring. I also love the ancient myths about virgin births and resurrections from the dead that predate the story of Jesus that so many of us celebrate each year.

But best of all, I love contemporary scientific accounts that are woven into poetry by UU singer-songwriter Peter Mayer. In his song "Turn Me, Earth" he sings:

> Turn me earth to a new sunrise Turn me into the light of morning. Turn me earth when I close my eyes. Turn me into the night. Turn me earth to the blackbird's trill Turn me into the light of morn. Round again to the whippoorwill. Turn me into the night.

As you're spinning light and dark Turn me into the light of morning, Turn me earth around your star Turn me into the night. Through the seasons we will go Turn me into the light of morning, Summer rain and winter snow. Turn me into the night.

"Holy Now", "Beauty of the World", "Church of the Earth", and "Blue Boat Home" are other songs where Mayer celebrates the miraculous world in which we live. This is not to say that there is nothing else for us to do but to enjoy the warmth, light, and bounty of spring.

Now, more than ever, we need to protect the earth and all of its beings. We need to protest the unimaginably cruel and destructive madness of our times. Perhaps the spring weather will bring more people into the streets to demand for a return to our democratic principles, to denounce injustice, to right all wrongs, and to advocate for peace.

The *American Unitarian Association* was officially formed on May 26,1825 at the Ministerial Conference in Berry Street, held at Federal Street Church in Boston. The conference adopted a constitution "to diffuse the knowledge and promote the interest of pure Christianity". William Ellery Channing was offered the presidency, but he declined and Aaron Bancroft of Worcester was chosen. By coincidence, the British and Foreign Unitarian Association formed on that same day in London. *Joseph Blanco White* died on May 20, 1841 at the age of sixty-five. A former Catholic priest, he wrote several books on social and religious issues after converting to Unitarianism.

The Church Mouse

On May 28, 1655 Unitarian *John Biddle* was freed from prison in England, having served six months for writing the "Two-fold Catechism". "Two-Fold" referred to his inclusion in the volume of a catechism for adults and a second one for children. The "Two-fold Catechism" advocated Unitarian doctrine, at that time a criminal offense in England.



IMMIGRATION ACTION

The US Immigration system is often referred to as "broken". Those seeking to enter the US from other countries face challenging and often cruel pathways as they hope for a new safe opportunity in the US for themselves and their families. The Trump administration has made the process more difficult, dangerous, and unjust as mass deportations threaten those who seek to apply for asylum and eventual citizenship. Even those with "green cards" are not secure, and Temporary Protected Status (TPS) expired April 24th. This puts many of our Haitian neighbors in danger.

Across the country organizations have formed to protect and support immigrants and refugees. Locally, Cedar Valley Advocacy for Immigrant and Refugee Rights (CVAIRR) offers information, support, and protection. Since January over a hundred people have signed on to CVAIRR for information and participation. There are several working groups.

The Know Your Rights (KYR) group offers training for immigrants and allies about how to deal with Immigration Customs Enforcement (ICE) officers. It is important for people to know that they do not have to open their door to ICE unless there is a warrant signed by a judge. KYR is fundamental protection from illegal ICE activity.

The Spirituality and Emotional Support group (SES) offers counseling for those who are living with fear and anxiety about the uncertainty of possible deportation. Clinical psychologists offer training for volunteers and support for those who seek counseling. Trained volunteers will be available in emergency situations.

The Ally Support group has received over 60 contacts by people who are willing to offer short term assistance in the form of transportation, food, and some shelter opportunities. Volunteers as well as those seeking help are vetted to provide authenticity.

The Political Action group offers information regarding federal, state, and local issues and opportunities for response.

The Rapid Response group is working with the CV Interfaith Alliance to have a list of people available on short notice to help with transportation, phone calls, and notice of ICE presence in the community.

CVUU has developed a "Comfort and Assist Policy" to offer short term support. Contact *Rosa Torres* or *Mollie Wallsteadt* for information.

William Emerson, the grandfather of famous Transcendentalist Ralph Waldo Emerson, was born in Concord, Massachusetts on May 31, 1743. He graduated from Harvard College in 1761 and taught school in Roxbury. He decided on the ministry and was ordained and installed on January 1, 1766, as minister of First Parish (Unitarian) in Concord. He married Phebe Bliss, the daughter of First Parish's previous minister. Emerson was a learned, effective, and well-loved pastor. On April 19, 1776, the Minutemen were organized to fight in the Revolution against England, and Emerson appeared promptly, gun in hand, when the first alarm sounded. He became their chaplain and was with them during battles. He died on October 20, 1776, of "camp fever", probably typhoid or dysentery. He should not be confused with his son of the same name, who was born on May 6, 1769, and died on May 11, 1811.

NEWS FROM THE ACCESSIBILITY TASK FORCE

The work of the ATF to identify and better define our options for attaining full accessibility in our building is continuing along three tracks:

1. Add an elevator to our current building. This "Accessibility PLUS" project was presented to the congregation at the ATF Second Hour session on November 17th. This option is sufficiently defined at this point including architect's plans and cost estimates.

2. The possible purchase of the fully accessible United Church of Christ property. This was also a subject of our November 17^{th} session. (More below.)

3. Find another option. Lockard realty is engaged with us on this. They are monitoring for availability of any type of building for sale in Cedar Falls or Waterloo that is fully accessible, is from about 25% larger to double the space we have now, and has off-street parking. As of this time, no such property has been found.

Meetings with the UCC folks are ongoing—nine meetings so far since January. Topics specifically addressed have included the general condition of building and grounds and possible repairs and upgrades, ongoing property maintenance and operating costs, technology, flooring updating, and the potential timing and possible future costs of roof membrane replacement. This effort will continue with the goal of being able to present a complete definition of this option this summer.

MINDFULNESS MEDITATION RETREAT

The Buddhist Path Small Group is sponsoring the second annual Mindfulness Meditation Retreat for the weekend of October 10-12th. This silent retreat includes multiple thirty-minute meditation sessions, videos of Buddhist teachings, and the opportunity for self-reflection and to become centered in your own personal journey. This retreat is open to all UUs, including members in other congregations.

The retreat is again being held at the lovely Creighton University Retreat Center in Griswold, Iowa. The retreat center is located on 134-wooded acres on the Nishnabotna River. There are groomed hiking trails, a labyrinth, and a screened-in gazebo on the edge of the woods to add a variety of options for personal reflection. Participants select how many meditation sessions to attend, and which other activities to engage in at the participant's own choice.

The \$220 total cost of the retreat includes six meals (Friday evening through Sunday lunch), housing in individual rooms for two nights, and all fees. Transportation to this southwestern Iowa venue must be arranged by participants. Registration requires payment in full. The payment is non-refundable, but may be transferred to another in the event a participant is unable to attend. Total space is limited to twenty participants at this time. Registration is open from now until September 15th, and will remain open until the twenty spaces are filled.

Autumn is a beautiful time of year to experience the Creighton University Retreat Center. The CURC also has a website with photos of the grounds if you care to check it out.
