GREETINGS FROM THE PRESIDENT

For many of us on academic calendars, June and July mark a time of transition. Students from preschool through high school are moving up a grade, and might be changing schools next year. High school students are graduating and moving on to jobs or undergraduate education. College students are also graduating and moving on to jobs or higher education. Many adults working in educational settings are facing transitions, too. All of these transitions affect not only us as individuals, but our family systems as well.

As of June 1st, I will be retired from UNI after thirty-one years of teaching and research in Psychology. If I add nine more years of similar work at U.C. Berkeley and other colleges and non-profit organizations, that's a forty-year professional career. I never really planned to be a college professor. What drove me into the field was curiosity. After finishing a B.A. in Music, I was consumed by the desire to understand how people think and learn. This led me to the study of developmental psychology, which then led me to teaching and research in the field.

I thought retirement would be easy—all I had to do was quit teaching and get on with my life. But for me it has been surprisingly difficult. I had no idea how many healthcare and financial decisions I would have to make. I also didn't realize how much I would miss teaching. To keep my foot in the door, I agreed to teach a class at UNI this coming fall. It's one of my favorite classes: Psychology of Science and Pseudoscience. I can offer it as a hybrid, which means I can teach it in person or remotely from any place in the world.

When I tell people that I'm planning to continue teaching on a part-time basis, they sometimes laugh and say, "Well, I guess that's one way to wean yourself from teaching." I find that comment disconcerting. Do people wean themselves from teaching like a mother weans a baby from her breast, or a doctor weans a patient from a drug? What ever happened to the notion of a calling? Aren't some of us called to teaching, to the ministry, to medicine, or to public service?

For those of you who are facing transitions this summer in your school, work, health, home, and relationships, I give you all my best. The nicest part about being a member of this beloved community is that it's not hard to find someone who has been through a similar transition and can offer a helping hand, some encouragement, or a bit of advice.

In the meantime, have a great summer! I look forward to hearing what you are doing during this wonderful time of year!

CVUU GENEROSITY FUND: HELPING THOSE IN NEED AT THE CVUU AND BEYOND

Did you know that a Generosity Fund is available at the CVUU to help members of the CVUU and people within the wider Cedar Valley community who are in need, e.g., for medication, heating assistance, food, etc.? Money in this fund is used at the discretion of the minister and is considered "restricted funds", which means it does not revert back to the general fund if unspent at the end of the fiscal year.

How does the Generosity Fund Work?

- If you would like to help keep the generosity fund available for those who need it, you can give money directly to the Generosity Fund at the CVUU by writing a check to the CVUU or using Tithely. Please designate "Generosity Fund" on the check memo line, through the Tithely process, or in a letter documenting the donation.
- The minister is responsible for identifying those in need of receiving money from the Generosity Fund and following the procedures outlined in the *CVUU Handbook* to give money to recipients and request reimbursement from the Finance Council. The Minister has complete discretion to distribute money from the fund as they see the need to do so. However, the minister should keep in mind that funds are limited, and this fund should be used sparingly.
- The Shared Ministry Council (SMC) is responsible for ensuring the Generosity Fund is replenished as needed and for reviewing and updating procedures as needed.
- The Finance Council is responsible for maintaining the Generosity Fund and for fund distributions to the minister when requested (as described in the *CVUU Handbook*).
- For more information about Generosity Fund replenishment and distribution processes and procedures followed by the Minister, Finance Council, and the Shared Ministry Council, see the Generosity Fund Policy & Procedures section of the *CVUU Handbook*.

TIME AT THE CVUU AND AWAY: PART OF THE UU MINISTERIAL AGREEMENT

It's common knowledge that ministers don't work a 9-to-5 job, but did you know that UU ministers typically work a 6-day work week and are responsible for monitoring their time to ensure an appropriate balance of work and time off? Ministry is understood as a calling, and the work of ministry is time-intensive and subject to unforeseen events. Sufficient down-time is essential to maintaining personal health and professional sustainability, and our CVUU ministerial agreement is designed to help our minister find that balance. This article provides a few highlights from Pastor Emma's ministerial agreement related to her time at the CVUU and away from us, as recommended by the Unitarian Universalist Association national (UUA): <www.UUA.org>.

Ministers are most known for the work they do on Sunday mornings. However, in addition to Sunday services, Pastor Emma provides many other types of ministry to the CVUU, including participation in almost all council, committee, and Board meetings; serving as the head of staff for our paid staff; providing pastoral care for congregants as needed; helping re-develop our religious education program; and more. In these multi-faceted roles, priorities are constantly shifting. Pastor Emma often works evenings and spends time in ways less tangible such as addressing congregational problems. Pastoral and congregational crises can occur at any time including days off.

It is expected that UU ministers will have, at a minimum, one day per week free of all Congregational responsibilities and one additional day devoted to study and writing wherein they will be available only for emergencies. Therefore, Pastor Emma works a 6-day work week. Her day off is Monday; her study and writing day is typically Saturday.

To offset this full work schedule, each CVUU fiscal year, in keeping with UUA recommendations, Pastor Emma receives four weeks of vacation (24 days), four weeks of study leave (24 days), ten days of sick leave, paid holidays, and one month of accrued sabbatical leave. In addition to vacation and study leave, attendance at national UUA General Assembly, regional UUA gatherings, UUMA (Unitarian Universalist Ministers Association) Chapter Meetings, and Ministry Days are considered associational responsibilities for which our minister may be away from the CVUU. Because of these various reasons to be away from the congregation, UU ministers typically lead or co-lead worship services between 30 and 35 Sundays each year.

Pastor Emma determines the schedule of her time away from the CVUU in consultation with the Religious Services Council, the Shared Ministry Council, and the Board President. If you have questions about Pastor Emma's time at or away from the CVUU, or other aspects of the ministerial agreement, please feel free to contact *Heather Flory*, Shared Ministry Council chair.

IUUWAN (Iowa Unitarian Universalist Witness Advocacy Network) is an organization that connects Iowa Unitarian Universalists to action on issues that concern the state.

This year churches from IUUWAN: in Dubuque, Cedar Rapids, Ames, Iowa City/Coralville, Des Moines, Marshalltown, Decorah, the Quad Cities, Burlington, Iowa Lakes and here in the Cedar Valley, have engaged UU congregations in advocacy for social and environmental justice issues at the legislative and personal level. IUUWAN attempts to promote linkage between UU congregations—some as small as 8 or 10 members. In Marshalltown the space a small group meets in is used during the week by a soup kitchen serving 150 people 5 days a week and members of the church volunteer there. This year in Decorah a group has held vigil weekly in the name of the ongoing genocide in Gaza. In Dubuque UU members participated in a die-in to draw attention to gun violence. Members have lobbied Iowa

legislators about the dangers of approving the CO_2 pipeline that undergirds the continuation of global warming and environmental catastrophe. Members at many churches have lobbied for women's rights to control their own bodies, to sustain civil rights of LGBTQ persons merely living their lives. Des Moines hosted their 5th Transgender Festival



attended by 1,500 folks, with financial help from IUUWAN. Many churches, including CVUU, hosted a "Climate Justice Revival" promoted by the UUA and IUUWAN that offered that experience to smaller churches. Presently IUUWAN has an active Environmental team and an Immigrant Rights team that meet regularly on line to share actions on these issues.

King William IV of England signed the Trinity Act, which repealed penalties for Unitarian belief on July 21, 1813. Robert Aspland said of the act, "Unitarians become for the first time free men in their native land."

John Adams, age ninety, and Thomas Jefferson, age eighty-three, the second and third U.S. presidents, respectively, died on the same day, July 4, 1826. Exactly fifty years earlier, the thirteen colonies heard the first public reading of the Declaration of Independence, of which Jefferson was the author and Adams a primary editor. Despite intense disagreement during their careers in political office, in later life they reconciled and conducted a famous correspondence, which included discussions of their differing views of Unitarianism.



MINDFULNESS MEDITATION RETREAT

The Buddhist Path Small Group is sponsoring the second annual Mindfulness Meditation Retreat for the weekend of October 10-12th. This silent retreat includes multiple thirty-minute meditation sessions, videos of Buddhist teachings, and the opportunity for self-reflection and to become centered in your own personal journey. This retreat is open to all UUs, including members in other congregations.

The retreat is again being held at the lovely Creighton University Retreat Center in Griswold, Iowa. The retreat center is located on 134-wooded acres on the Nishnabotna River. There are groomed hiking trails, a labyrinth, and a screened-in gazebo on the edge of the woods to add a variety of options for personal reflection. Participants select how many meditation sessions to attend, and which other activities to engage in at the participant's own choice.

The \$220 total cost of the retreat includes six meals (Friday evening through Sunday lunch), housing in individual rooms for two nights, and all fees. Transportation to this southwestern Iowa venue must be arranged by participants. Registration requires payment in full. The payment is non-refundable, but may be transferred to another in the event a participant is unable to attend. Total space is limited to twenty participants at this time. Registration is open from now until September 15th, and will remain open until the twenty spaces are filled.

Autumn is a beautiful time of year to experience the Creighton University Retreat Center. The CURC also has a website with photos of the grounds if you care to check it out. WHO WAS FRANK SCHULMAN?

With regard to the UU-related history facts that are in our newsletters, who was Frank Schulman? *Jacob Frank Schulman* (1927–2006) was a U.S. Unitarian Universalist minister, theologian, and author of several books. He held numerous degrees, including a B.A. from the University of Oklahoma, an S.T.B. from Harvard Divinity School, a D.Phil., M.A., and Minister Emeritus Scholar from Oxford University, and an honorary Doctorate of Divinity from Meadville Lombard Theological School.



Schulman was the author of several theological and historical books, and specialized particularly in the study of 19th-Century religious figures, especially Charles Wellbeloved, Ralph Waldo Emerson, and James Martineau. He was also a minister for most of his life, serving in Youngstown, Ohio, and at Emerson Church in Houston, Texas, for 25 years, in addition to many other churches, some in England. Schulman served as a teacher to ministry students at Manchester College at Oxford University from 1989 to 1996. In retirement he served as the first minister for a small congregation in Huntsville, Texas, which has become Thoreau Woods Unitarian-Universalist Church.
